# **Syllabus**

## Course

Ethics and Values IGED 140 Fall 2023 Credit hours: 3

**Modality:** Asynchronous **Time zone:** Eastern Time

Course description: This course satisfies the 3-credit Interdisciplinary General Education Program requirement that focuses on improving students' ethical reasoning skills. The goal of this course is to teach students how to make value-based decisions that are grounded in an awareness of the ethical implications of one's actions. Students grapple with twenty-first century ethical problems and learn to argue from multiple perspectives to demonstrate that there is not always an absolute answer to every ethical question. They study an array of moral concepts, principles, and codes used frequently in the discussions of ethics and apply them to everyday issues.

# **Learning Outcomes**

#### During this course, students will learn how to:

- Articulate the personal sets of values they bring with them to college.
- Identify 21<sup>st</sup> century ethical problems and describe how they relate to historical and global debates.
- Describe an array of moral concepts, principles and codes used frequently in the discussions of ethics and apply them to everyday issues.
- Be aware of one's place in the world as a global citizen, open and attentive to diversity across the spectrum of different ethical interpretive perspectives.

## **Course Requirements**

The following provides the specific and descriptive criteria for the evaluation of required course work and your participation.

- **Blackboard Discussions** –25% There will be discussion board forums that require active participation and group activities on the weekly reading assignments. Students should complete required reading assignments to effectively prepare for class discussion on Blackboard.
- Reflective Writing 2 reflective writing assignments each worth 10% 20% total Students will be required to complete two writing exercises that will serve as a personal reflection of the weekly reading assignments.
- Test Your Knowledge Quizzes 25% Throughout each module there will be a series of test your knowledge quizzes. The quizzes are opportunities for students to apply knowledge learned from the chapters, videos, and discussions.
- Final Case Studies Analysis 30% Students will select two of the four case studies and will be required to analyze the case studies using principles and theories learned throughout the semester.
- Extra Credit 5% Students will have the opportunity to earn extra credit beginning in the third week by participating in weekly philosophy meme discussion posts. Instructions about how to make and post memes, as well as interpret them, will be a part of the regularly graded content for module two.

# **Grading Methods**

When to expect assignment scores and feedback: Feedback will generally be provided within one week of the due date for an assignment. Please communicate with your instructor if you have any questions.

If an actual grade is given, the instructor will provide instructions as to how the grade is tabulated at midterm. A satisfactory grade at mid-term is not an indication of a passing grade at the final.

Active participation, the ability to apply the concepts introduced in class, the ability to research a subject, and the ability to work in a group are all part of the learning process. Assignments more than seven days late will not be accepted.
